

Starting with Bees



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Preparation (before bees arrive)

- Buy all equipment and put it together
 - Paint the outside only
- Bee protective equipment and tools should be on hand on B-Day







Preparation (before bees arrive)

- Location
 - Sun exposure or hiding from neighbors?
 - Easy access
 - Good ventilation
 - Low humidity
 - Off the ground
 - Protected from wind





Preparation (before bees arrive)

Hard to relocate after installing the bees





How Many Hives?

- One?
- Two?
- Ten?



- Two would be the minimum recommended
 - More could be too much work for a beginner
 - One is at risk in the case something goes wrong
 - Second hive is the cost of the hive and bees (no tools)



Bees and Equipment Master Program Recommendations

- Race matters: Italian or Carniolan?
 - Carniolan
- Langstroth, Warre, Top Bar?
 "Standard" or Langstroth
- 8 or 10 frames?
- Deep or Western?
- New or used?
 - New (when possible)



Make all decisions before buying bees.

Buying Bees (or not)

Nucs

Langstroth deep only

- Package
 - Any hardware
- Swarm: Free bees!
 - You need to have the hardware ready ahead of time





Package vs Nuc

Package

- No hardware disease (fresh start)
- Need to make comb and introduce queen
- No food in the hive so the bees depend on the beekeeper

Nuc

- Hardware may bring disease
- Laying queen with comb increases faster
- Frames contain some honey, pollen, eggs and larva (sometimes)



Nuc Installation





Package Installation

- 3 lbs = 10,500 bees
- If syrup can is empty, sprinkle syrup on screen
- Protect from extreme temperatures
- Allow air circulation (they regulate themselves)





Package Installation

- Use one deep box or two Western boxes for installing package
- Install the bees late in the day to prevent
 - other bees bothering them
 - Bees drifting to other hives





































Working the Bees

- Wait about one week before checking the hive thoroughly!
- Bee Suit and gloves Start fully protected





Working the Bees

 Move slowly and avoid hitting hive or dropping objects on the ground





Working the Bees - Smoke

Smoker

- Natural fuel is best
- Light the smoker
- Avoid flame-throwing
- Keep smoldering for cool smoke





Working the Bees - Smoke

- Use little smoke in entrance and under the top cover
- Give time for smoke to work before opening





Working the Bees- Weather

- Bees are calm with nice weather
- >55F between 10am and 4pm
 - Forager bees will be outside
- Easier during nectar flow
- Avoid working before a storm
- If working under the rain, use cover
 - Water kills bees





Working the Bees - Sting

Deal with sting

- Only 0.5% children and 3% adults are allergic
- Swelling, redness, itching are not allergic reactions and are normal
- Scrape stinger off as soon as possible (it keeps pumping venom as long as it stays in the skin)





Feeding

 During the first week feed without disrupting the colony too much





Feeding (cont.)

1:1 Sugar:Water ratio for feed (any sugar)







What to Expect

- After one week, it's time to inspect the hive in detail
 - Amount of bees will be about the same than the quantity that arrived in the package (a small amount died in one week)
- Keep feeding as long as bees take it





What to Expect

- Need to confirm queen activity
 - Presence of eggs and larva is enough proof
 - No need to find the actual queen
- New comb in frames





Bee Journal

- Keep good records
- What to do different next year
- Mentor will need information of condition leading to an issue
- Options:
 - Write on the hive
 - Paper log/notebook
 - Online records

Requeening

- If there is a problem with the queen, it can be replaced following the same process used for installing a package.
- Bee Package vendors usually also sell queens
